The Lake of Two Mountains Artists are holding their spring exhibition at the beginning of May at St. James Church, always a wonderful setting for atistic events.

The art gallery section of the Two Barn Owls venue behind the Pure Art Boutique will be busy all spring and summer. The Barn Owls Mavis Martin and Nancy Farnum show their own work but also have a wide variety of guest artists coming in. In addition, they plan to present music in collaboration with the Hudson Music Festival.

ing: it's about five feet by four, all white with white diagonal lines. His friend Marc, in a fit of unbridled honesty, tells Serge he's been had: surely, Yvan, their mild-mannered friend, agrees with him? But Yvan refuses to take sides, and the three men are launched into a fierce debate that tests the bonds of their longstanding friendship.

A multiple award-winner including the 1998 Tony Award for Best Play – its recent production at London's Old Vic demonstrates 'Art' is as funny and relevant now as it was twenty years ago. Director Dean Patrick Fleming, who has over 50 theatre productions to his credit, including last season's Norm Foster hit Jonas and Barry in the Home, will direct this witty modern classic on the limits of honesty among friends.

Also, new small works will be on display at QDBC in our on-going and popular - TABLE TOP STORIES exhibition.


AND NOW FOR SOMETHING COMPLETELY DIFFERENT

Along the River's Edge

Surface and Story

As I draw near to the end of my thesis writing, with hopefully but a few months to go, in a most recent writing session I made mention of an article that dealt with "texture and structure"1 (reference below) when dealing with how to write up a phenomenological approach to qualitative research. In other words ...phenomenon. And though this may sound all very

heady and academic, the exercise inspired me. Arising was a different sent of words, asking me how we might consider looking at the narrative of a painting: through surface and story.

As we glance over quickly the surface of a painting, we are sometimes initially struck, by either colour or shape, or both. We may be mesmerized by depth, or perception, or simply an order of things we cannot yet grasp, but find appealing nonetheless. Or we may be downright confused by shapes and figures we find unimaginable, disorganized or sultry. We sometimes do not comprehend that there may also be a story trying to unfold; and you the viewer become part of the narrative, as you enter into dialogue – whether that be with the artist, or simply yourself.

Every artist has a different approach to their art, as unique as the individual themselves. Needless to say, there is a beginning point, a brave first stroke, and an ending period; or perhaps a lingering comma, or question mark. For

myself, my paintings can often start with an 'I don't know where to begin, but I know I have to paint' type of feeling. In these intuitive moments it is about laying aside my judgment, my cautiousness, and allow the energy to come through – for undoubtedly there is often something for me to see, to learn, to question, and to wonder about.

The development of a canvas for me, could be a part of my own story that needs unfolding or processing, or a culmination of the abstract ideas, and tensions of others, I have been carrying around for a while, and need to let go of. As an abstract artist, it rarely is about a still life, or an exercise outwardly based. I flounder horribly with those! Still mostly self-taught, my floundering renders itself as a spiritual practice that grounds me, often times exhausts me and yet grants me a sound modicum of joy.

And then there is the story – the chapters that are indicative of the paragraphs of time that move us beyond surface noise and colour. These occasions may be hard to come by or understand. And not that this is important. More so, I would hope that silence is the concerning effort. For the more we stand still and reflect with a

piece of art, the more is revealed, the more we connect with our own memories, desires, foibles, and at times even charisma.

The story may ask us to revisit the surface, and yet we bring with us a knowing of what was not there for us before. And so the surface speaks again, but with a different tonality, a different hint of light, or shadows cast against a backdrop we didn't see the first time. The longer we linger, the more characters may surface, and who are they, for the artist? And for you? What doors open, or close? Or continue to revolve?

Art is an eternal thing, some indescribable mystery that lingers throughout our history books, evoking and stoking the strongest of passions, and frailties of the human condition. When we hold the tension between 'surface and story' we may be cast into an illuminative process of vulner-

ability, transparency and beckoned to summon our courage for reasons unbeknownst to us but a few moments ago. We may be asked to address rooms in our houses that we haven't walked through for decades. We may be questioned about where we need light, and honesty. We may be asked to speak to values and principles that we had left dormant for years. Or we may simply find a piece colourful enough to match our new sofa. Oh....did I say anything about archetypes?

engage with art, the important thing is to engage. With art.
Make decisions as to where your eyes and your heart ask you to linger, and for what reasons. What does the surface tell you? And where is the story? What is the story? Be curious. Practice your curiosity. Go for a walk, or a run, or a crawl along the surface of colour, and texture, and depth, and lines, and spaces...and see if you fall into a story.

Regardless of how we may

See if you fall in love, or not. See if you breathe deeply or remain like a shallow, unlit flint on a winter's night. All are sparks for the imagination. All can change your mind about a multitude of things. All can shift your perception, and your judgment. These are all but a few of the multitude of reasons to support artists. Art can play an important role in the development of your own identity and character, as it serves to help you hold the tension between your own surface and story.

I hope to see some of you at my upcoming show @ Hudson Gallery Plus, 448 Main Rd. the weekend of April 20th, as part of the Gallery's pop-up initiatives. I invite you into conversation, , and what happens as you come face-to-face with the surface and stories of many of the paintings that will be on display. See you soon!

The Hudson Festival of Canadian Film

The mighty film projector has been switched off and the 3rd edition of the Hudson Festival of Canadian Film is now a pleasant and exciting memory.

Festivities began on February 28 with two screenings of Expo 67: Mission impossible. Many of those attending the two sold out performances had the direct experience of working at the 1967 World Fair but add to that those who simply attended and there very few left in the category of "we are encountering this for the first time."

Director, Eric Ruel delivered a very interesting question and answer session and the afternoon one included a telephone interview with Philippe de Gaspé Beaubien who happily answered questions from his winter home in Florida. With his razor sharp memory on full display he reinforced the documentary's conclusion that Expo 67 was one of the great peace time achievements in Canadian history.

The featured Thursday evening program was called Ben's Night and the almost sold-out audience enjoyed a varied selection of short films by new and immerging filmmakers.

Dedicated to the memory of Ben McKinnon it began with a short introduction by his brother Liam. This was followed by an early collaboration between Ben and singer-songwriter Vivianne LaRiviere. After the filmed rendition of her song, Tell Me Life, Vivianne had this to say, "Whilst thinking ahead to the evening about to unfold, anticipating who knows what and thinking about what an evening such as this might mean, (and to whom?) while in conversation with Liam McKinnon, I found for myself, that such events not necessarily beg the question 'what is art?' but rather...what is 'good art?' When I think back on the journey of the song Tell Me Life, and how it was written, while anxiously awaiting major surgery, and having come face-to-face with the pinnacle of life's most precious moments, as the questions and timeless moments unfolded, so did the song. There was the journey of getting it recorded - almost a year and a half later. Subsequently, there were the efforts in trying to get the song air played as well as a video made. Through all of this I met Ben McKinnon. That too was a process of several meetings, and eventually not one but two different seasonal shoots, the editing process, and more process still, getting it to air on YouTube, and

Vimeo. The song has found its way into the ears and hearts of many, for many different occasions: everything from concerts to retreats, and yes, radio air play along the way. That said, I still wonder after decades of being artistically involved in many a project - what makes something 'good art?' It is such a subjective question, and many have different points of view on how to determine the answer. But I wonder if when a piece of art is resurgent, if that has anything to do with whether it is 'good or bad art?' When it offers a message that crosses the lines of space and time. In other words - when given its various lives, it stands the test of longevity. Tell Me Life was written almost ten years ago and almost a decade later, I have the humble privilege of seeing it and sharing it with a wonderful group of people on a big screen. Thanks to Ben McKinnon. As Ben and I walked through the shooting points along Rigaud Mountain, I learned a lot about this young man, and the devotion and passion he displayed for the love of 'good art.' My heart was heavy this evening, Ben's night. And the tears did not neglect to surface. Though Ben's physical being is not here with us, his spirit is very present in the room, and his soul has left us an archive of 'good art."

A further example of Ben's 'archival effect' would be the path of others in the Rigaud Mountain group of film enthusiasts and that brings to mind Jeremy Thibodeau who has taken the love of the art form to a business he calls Rubicon Pictures and Media. An active community of passionate creative, storytellers and communications strategists developing intellectual property collectively. Jeremy introduced two examples of the Rubicon Group's work.

Next up was a film called Fear of Snakes directed by Andreas (continued on p. 12) Hudson Film Festival (continued from page 11)

Mendritzki. He grew up in a small town between London and Sarnia, Ontario where he first became interested in film as a possible life's work and enrolled in the 4 year film course at Concordia in Montreal. After graduation, he began production of a short film based on a poem by Lorna Crozier of Swift Current, Saskatchewan called Fear of Snakes. Produced with 35mm film stock it was entered in the Chicago Children's Film Festival where entries had to be based on published poetry. He won the first prize of \$10,000.00 which served to finance his early entry into the film production business.

A film called Night Shift by Hudson's Andrew Oster was screened next. Shot on Cameron Street and in Shaar's Depaneur, it featured several local actors and was received warmly by the audience. Unfortunately Andrew wasn't on hand to introduce his film because he was involved in a late night planning meeting for another film.

What would you think about a film written by a 6 year old boy and then animated by a 20 year old filmmaker? It was next and was called The Bear That Wanted To Be A Horse. Conceived by Ryan Hill (now 7) and drawn by Calvin Brett, it wowed the audience by its unique hand drawn colourful rendition with voicing by Ryan and Calvin.

At last year's Festival we screened a short film by Jason Seelman from London, Ontario called Whisky. He returned this year with his newest effort titled, The One I Adore. It was a well constructed story with a twist at the end which brought forth some audience discussion.

Craig Commanda is a young Indigenous film maker who produced a film full of colour and subtle film angles, Call and Response. It was spellbinding and made us all think of a film to be presented during Adventure Saturday called Rumble: The Indians Who Rocked the World. Most certainly Craig will be a filmmaker who will reach out to the world.

Many of us have experienced

the unwanted calls from computer experts who suggest we should let them correct the faults in our computers - at great cost, of course. Well the next film, Cold Call was about a welcome revenge or get even moment when that happens. Conceived and written by James Murray, the film hit a recognizable chord for many in the audience.

The penultimate film of the evening came from the National Film Board. In Threads, her latest animated short, Academy Award-winning director Torill Kove explored the beauty and complexity of parental love, the bonds that we form over time, and the ways in which they stretch and shape us.

As the evening drew to a close it was becoming clear how important Ben's night was. The energy and passion of the filmmakers was exciting to see and the varied program was a winning one for the audience. In future years this evening could easily become the highlight of the Festival. The art of Film and the direction of youth would be a tough combination to ignore. But we weren't yet finished - the featured short film moment of the evening was about to begin with the arrival of another McKinnon brother. Seb.

It has been a difficult time for Seb and he had been controlling his emotions by working very hard in an ambitious and difficult feature film project and he was about to show us one scene that had been completed. The working name of the film is The Stolen Child and what Ben delivered to the Audience was visually stunning. He brought with him, Oriana Leman, the actress that would be featured in the film and she was very impressive in the scene. In the Q&A that followed, Seb outlined his plan for a 2 million dollar fund raising initiative and I'm sure there wasn't a person in the audience who wouldn't want to donate even in a small way. It is certainly the hope that the finished project can be achieved and we will all get to see the completed film on the Theatre's screen.

All of those members of the audience who had anything to do with the films of the evening were asked to come to the front for a group photo-

graph. It was an impressive group that assembled and it was easy to see that the love of film exists in our midst and the talent is there to support many projects.

Another highlight of the Festival was the Friday night film Meditation Park which was completed in Vancouver by one of Canada's celebrated Directors, Mina Shum who had arrived earlier in the day to celebrate the occasion with us.

In this wonderfully entertaining feature, a faithful wife, mother, and grandmother is stunned to find racy orange panties in her husband's pile of laundry. Forced to reassess everything that she thinks about her marriage, she confronts the issue head-on, and embarks on a journey toward truth (continued on page 14)

The Hudson Chamber Music Series' 35th season concludes on March 25 with a very special concert devoted to the complete cycle of J.S. Bach's sonatas for violin and harpsi-

chord. The concert will take place at 4pm in St. James Church Hall (642 Main Road in Hudson). Our two soloists will be Mark Fewer on violin and Hank Knox on harpsichord, both of

whom are internationally renowned as soloists and chamber musicians.

Mark Fewer has performed around the world to great acclaim. His repertoire ranges from the early Baroque to avant-garde jazz. He has made eight recordings since 2010. In 2012 he won a Juno Award for best contemporary jazz album, performing a jazz violin concerto written for him by Phil Dwyer. In the same year, his recording of the chamber works of Serge Arcuri garnered a Prix Opus, and he made his conducting debut with I Musici de Montréal

performing his own arrangements of standards by Miles Davis and Duke Ellington. A former member of the St. Lawrence String Quartet, Mark has taught at Stanford and McGill.

Hank Knox is a founding member of Montreal's Arion Baroque Orchestra, with whom he has toured on four continents. He also performs. records and tours with the Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra, Les Violons du Roy, le Studio de musique ancienne de Montréal, and l'Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal. His numerous recordings as soloist and chamber musician include separate collections of Frescobaldi keyboard works for the Atma Classique and early-music.com labels. He teaches harpsichord and continuo in the Early Music programme at McGill, where he also conducts the McGill Baroque Orchestra and directs a series of Baroque operas for Opera McGill.

and liberation. The Film also marked the reunion of director Mina Shum and actress Sandra Oh, who began their film careers together in 1994's Double Happiness. 23 years later, they tell an empowering tale of a woman regaining control over parts of her life that she long considered lost. The film went on to win the Hudson Festival Audience Favourite Award and opened in Canadian Theatres on March 9.

Stephanie Pages, a Producer of Les rois mongols introduded the film on Saturday evening to an audience eagerly awaiting Director Luc Picard's latest. It recently won a 'Crystal Bear' at the Berlin International Film Festival. Set during Quebec's infamous October Crisis it featured brilliant acting from the young cast. The very enjoyable 1 hour and 40 minute film was followed by an interesting session with Stephanie Pages fielding many questions surrounding the Berlin

experience.

All told, there were 10 films, 4 documentaries and 6 features, plus Ben's Night's short films, screened from Wednesday to Sunday. Some were enjoyed better than others but taken together it was an interesting Cinema adventure and many of the Pass holders saw all the films.

Movies have always been a part of my life from the moment, as a voung boy. I was given 35 cents by my Mother on a Saturday to get a haircut. I went to the Barber School and got a haircut for 10 cents and used the left over 25 cents to go to a movie. and harpsichord sonatas on the Leaf Music label. A taste of what is in store for our audience can be found at

Mark and Hank discuss their recording sessions and play excerpts from the sonatas. Copies of the recording should be available for purchase at the concert. Several of their performances of other works can also be found on YouTube.

The Bach sonatas are pillars the classical music repertoire. They have been recorded by many of the greats: Menuhin, Suk, Grumiaux, Szeryng, Perlman, Argerich, Gould, Koopman, Pinnock, and so on. Bach wrote these works in trio sonata form: there are upper parts for the violin and the harpsichord, and the harpsichordist does double duty by also improvising a bass line.

Sonatas in which the keyboard participated as an equal partner with the other solo instrument were a radical innovation at the time.

Bach explores an astonishing range of musical mood in these sonatas, as well as a very wide diversity of gestures, including elaborate fugues and independent melodic lines in the two upper voices. In form and substance they far transcended the musical practices of the time. In their video about the rehearsals and recording sessions of the sonaatas, both musicians remark that they would often finish performing a movement and remark to each other that it was the most beautiful piece of music they had ever played together - until the next movement.

Individual tickets will be available at the door at a cost of \$25 for adults and \$20 for seniors.

Hudson Music Club Once Upon a Mattress

It always begins with "Once Upon a Time"- four of the most magical words in the English language. And once again, this February, the Hudson Music Club took over the Hudson Village Theatre to weave their own kind of magic. Their production of Once Upon a Mattress, a show for all ages, is based on the Hans Christian Andersen fairy tale of The Princess and the Pea.


Set in the fictitious medieval European court of King Sextimus the Silent (John Wilson) and Queen Aggravain, (Gail Marchand), the search was on for a "genuine" princess to marry their son, Prince Dauntless the Drab (Andrew McLennan), who was indeed very drab. However, candidates had to pass an arduous test, set by Queen Aggravain, who did not, it became apparent, want any princess, or anyone at all, to win her son. And there was yet another complication. Until a suitable match could be found for the prince, no one else in the kingdom could get married. And since among the lords and ladies, there were other romances brewing, everyone was rooting for the prince.

Princesses of every ilk tried and failed to pass the impossible feats and quizzes set out by the queen, until finally a different kind of princess appeared. Princess Winnifred the Woebegone (Ashley Dunn), Princess of the Marshland was so determined to win the prince that she swam the castle moat just to get there! Neither a conventional beauty, nor a frail and fragile aristocrat, this wonderful Winnifred was solidly built, plain spoken, and crowned with a glorious head of wild red curls. She had no pretentions, wanted to be called "Fred", and soon charmed everyone at the court, including the prince.

But not, of course, his mother, who set out to create a test that she was sure Winnifred would fail. It was test of "sensitivity". She piled twenty mattresses on Winnifred's bed, and hid a pea under the bottom one. A true princess, she claimed, would feel the pea, and not be able to sleep a wink.

So, which of these two strong-willed female characters would prevail????

Once Upon a Mattress (music and lyrics by Rogers and Barer, book by Thompson, Fuller and Barer), originally opened in New York in 1959. Winnifred's role was the launching pad for the career of a young Carol Burnett. In this Hudson production, Nadia Verrucci directed and choreographed and Jennifer Baltuonis was the musical director. The ingenious and richly coloured set designs by Jean Claude Olivier were effective, and costumes, by Gail Marchand, inspired. The whole cast, including lords and ladies, jester, wizard and minstrel had a natural chemistry that was great fun for an audience that ranged in age from five to eighty. The musical numbers in this show had all the fun and energy of Broadway in the 1950's. But Winnifred the Woebegone, who fought bullying and duplic-



ity with honesty and determination, was still a perfect heroine for today.

The Hudson Music Club has been bringing to our community award winning musical productions in many genres for 66 years. Hopefully, it will continue for many years to come.


