Cinderella, this year's Christmas pantomime, written and directed by John Sheridan, arrives at the Hudson Village Theatre on December 13. I snuck into the back row of the theatre to watch a rehearsal last weekend, and I am glad to report that the magic is underway.

Upon entering, I am entranced to see that the theatre lobby has been transformed into a costume-creating workshop filled with yards of tulle, satin, sparkles and braid. "Panto moms" are busily cutting sewing, pressing and gluing under the auspices of costume mistress Carla Labrosse (also in the show, along with her daughter - panto tends to be a family affair). Outfitting a cast of nearly forty individuals of every age and shape with costumes lovingly designed to enable the actors to better feel their roles is a huge undertaking.

Inside the theatre, I took a seat and gazed at the set. Two prosceniums designed by J. C. Olivier (who sadly passed away earlier this year) aided by Jonathan Brookes and James Berryman sit in front of the curtain.

For there was deep snow on the ground, the wind was blowing something fierce, and none of our furniture was scheduled to arrive until some time in the New Year. Undaunted, however, and wanting to spend at least Christmas Eve around our newly-found fireplace in celebration of our new adventure together. we arrived that afternoon with her dear old Mom, logs and kindling that we had bought at a gas station on Decarie Blvd, a picnic hamper stocked with goodies, wine and champagne, blankets, and three sleeping bags that we spread out on the floor and really celebrated before finally falling asleep before a glowing fire.

Heading back to Montreal the following day with twinkling Christmas lights everywhere and with snow-

flakes falling transforming the landscape into a carpet of white, we all agreed. It was truly a magical night that we shall never forget.

In the years and winters to come, we were to discover and enjoy much more of Hudson's fabulous festive fare that truly amazed us considering the actual size of the town of only 5,000 or so residents none of whom at that point we had actually met.

Gobsmacked to learn that special services were being held at four churches no less and, although not religious souls in the traditional sense, we did the rounds before finally deciding that Midnight Mass conducted by Father Roland Demers at St. Thomas Aquinas Church was to become part of our new tradition. Two services, one in English the other in French, and the pews at both were always absolutely packed to the rafters with young and old alike. Go figure!

We would also go on to discover

wonderful Christmas Readings by members of the Hudson Players Club which has been entertaining the community since 1948, an actual year-round Christmas store on Cameron, myriad Christmas bazaars and fairs that are always raising funds for some worthwhile cause, the Town's official Lighting of the Lights complete with choir, hand-held candles and cups of warming hot chocolate and, down on the Lake of Two Mountains, skating, the temporary treelined Hudson-Oka Ice Bridge, ice fishing and clusters

of huts of every colour and size in the bay complete with cars and trucks creating what was surely a little village all unto itself until the big melt.

Then, of course, there was the fantastic volunteer-run Royal LePage Firemen's Christmas Basket Fund Auction at Hudson Village Theatre with the inimitable Michael Lawrence working his magic to boost the bids while raising urgently-needed funds for a most worthy cause. Still going strong, this is the second year that it was staged at the Falcon Golf Club and what a resounding success it was.

As to how it all began way back in 1977? Explains its founder Janet Ellerbeck, "I decided to have a little in-house auction at our Christmas party at the office and we raised \$200 that year with the proceeds going to the fund. With the help of other brokers each year the event continued to grow, and when my daughter Tania decided to join forces with me, we decided to take the occasion to a higher level and we rented the Hudson Village Theatre for the auction. And over the years, it has raised over \$400,000, which is used by the Fire Department to assist an average of 50 families every year at Christmas as well as to provide support throughout the year when needed." Bravo Janet to you and your team of dedicated volunteers for a wonderful initiative that just keeps on rolling!

And speaking of HVT, Hudson can be truly proud of its annual Christmas Pantomime, first launched back in the year 2,000 by Heather Markgraf-Lowe, the theatre's founder, and the only one in Quebec, if not all of Canada, to have such an extended run from December through January.

Says Heather, "I began this annual fundraiser for the theatre by enlisting the help of the local community to stage a classic British Panto, a family tradition of ours having grown up in the U.K., and the response was immediate and fantastic. Young and old, many of them never having appeared on stage before, responded to the call and a new Hudson tradition was born!"

On a personal note, I have appeared in two - Treasure Island (2006) and The Emperor's New Clothes (2007) - and I have to tell you, speaking from experience, that it is a wonderful fun-filled coming together of local actors and dancers of all ages including tiny tots who give it their all for audiences from far and wide throughout the region. This year's production, written and directed by John Sheridan, is Cinderella - The Panto opening on December 13 and running through January 5 with matinee and evening performances. Fabulous fun for the entire family. But don't leave it too late to book a seat. They always sell out faster than hot cross buns!

And the clock is certainly clicking down to Hudson's eagerly awaited Santa Claus Parade organized for the first time this year by the Soulanges I rish Society which, since 2019, has played the same role for the phenomenally successful Hudson St. Patrick's Day Parade and, again for the first time, being staged at 5 p.m. on December 14. It sure promises to be a really memorable one according to Society president and co-founder Jay de la Durantaye.

Says Jay, "With a committee of 12 and many volunteers we have been working on the parade since August and the response has been tremendous. We will have about 30 floats, a marching band, and a lot more participation by local community groups and businesses than we have for St. Patrick's Day for sure. And as it is in the evening and with all the lights, it will certainly be more magical for the youngsters with one of the highlights being Shriners wearing their lit-up illuminated clown outfits."

It goes without saying, of course, that our winters just ain't what they used to be given undeniable climate change being felt worldwide. Why, many of us were still raking leaves and putting the garden to bed in late November this time around. Once again, the ice bridge is iffy. Ditto for ice fishing. And who can possibly predict what the next few months will bring in terms of temperatures and snowfall? But one thing is for certain. The Christmas festive spirit will once again be alive and well in our little hamlet of Hudson and environs. Ho. Ho. Ho!

ESCAPE TO SUNNY ITALY WITH SALINA

And now from the promise of a winter wonderland to sunny Italy. And no, you don't need to take a flight from Dorval. For, in a manner of speaking, Italy has come to our neck of the woods courtesy of Hudsonites Salvatore 'Sal' Veccio and Lina Simone who two years ago embarked on a new adventure in their lives. Namely Les Aliments Salina on Harwood Blvd. in the Centre d'Achats shopping centre which is believed to be the only store of its kind in the region selling a vast range of products virtually all directly imported from Italy where Sal was born in the little town of Pilone exactly 75 years ago this November. Hence the party that I crashed! And what a party it was for Sal, his partner Lina, their extended family, and regular clients from far and wide.

Was fascinated to learn that it was a circuitous route that brought Sal, who speaks four languages, here. From Italy, he went to Germany from the ages of 10 to 18 before moving to Canada in 1969 where he would go on to work for VW for 25 years and teach night school mechanics for Laurier MacDonald Trade School for two years before

opening his own very successful business in St. Leonard in 1998 which he sold just two years ago.

Lina, who was born in Toronto and worked there as a registered nurse in palliative care, has an equally fascinating background. Upon arriving in Hudson in 1998 she would continue to work as a registered nurse before retiring in 2020 to start up her own cooking operation for people who needed help with their meals, including out-of-town family members who were not available for whatever reason.

So how did this dynamic duo first meet and whose idea was it to open such a store as Salina?

Laughs Lina, "We first met online 10 years ago and Sal moved to Hudson in 2021 and it was definitely his idea. It came about because he was sick of going to the local stores and complaining about their price fixing and high prices. He felt that prices were much lower in the city and it is for that reason that we try to keep our prices as low as possible. Also, there was not really any store like ours in the area. I loved the idea right from the start and did not hesitate at all."

Adds Lina, "What's more, almost everything comes from Italy and we love not only the quality but also the fact that they are made with few

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Shirley Valentine by Willy Russell Presented at the Hudson Village Theatre, directed by Heather Markgraf-Lowe Review by Kathryn Lamb

Shirley Valentine, every woman's best friend from childhood, reappeared on the stage at the Hudson Village Theatre last month for a long-overdue visit. We felt so at home, as she invited us into her kitchen for a chat. She talked about her disappointing husband, ungrateful kids, and friends who had taken different life paths, all while she was chopping and frying the chips that would be expected by her family for their tea. The kitchen was retro with the prerequisite chrome-framed dinette set, her accent pure Liverpool, but we were right there with her.

Shirley talks to us as she moves through the set, confiding in us as if we were her best mate. Her daughter pays no attention to her unless she needs something. Her son Brian, who had once brought a school nativity play to an abrupt

halt when, playing Joseph, he insisted on a room at the inn, because "he had booked" (my favorite line), was now in some trouble with the law. And her husband Joe, although Shirley still fondly remembers how it used to be when they laughed together, makes her wonder "Why, if somebody says I love you, it seems to automatically give them the right to treat you worse than people they only like, or people they don't like at all".

It is not every family's story, but it is a familiar one, as seventies British tunes drift over the stage ("I Can't Get No Satisfaction", "World Without Love"). Her only alternative role model was a school friend who had created a more lavish and exciting lifestyle by becoming a hooker. So, when another friend offers her a two-week vacation in Greece, she realizes that nobody at home really needs her, and despite a few lingering doubts, she goes for it. And so, her education begins.

They arrive in Greece, and Shirley's friend promptly dumps her for a guy. But she finds a café on a beach, a new friend, and life begins to open up.

Shirley discovers that "dreams are never in the places we expect them to be". She falls in love, I think, not with a guy, but with the idea of living. "Why" she muses to herself, "do we have all these feelings and dreams and hopes, if they can't ever be used?"

Where will she go with this new knowledge? Will she want to go back to her old existence after two weeks in Greece? I think Shirley has tasted and learned far too much for that.

This play, by Willy Russell, is

built around a brilliant script that was faultlessly delivered to us by one actor, Lisa Bronwyn Moore. A tour de force by any standard. It was directed by Hudson Village Theatre founder Heather Markgraf, who herself has played Shirley on several previous occasions. And with the help of Karen Pearce's costumes, Shirley morphs from an apron-clad housewife to a much wiser free spirit.

The continuing appeal of this play, several decades after its writing, is due, I believe, to its timeless humour, the familiarity of its portrayal of family dynamics, and the way women of a certain age still seem to disappear into the background of daily life. We still have our marbles plus lots of experience, and we deserve to be acknowledged and at least (maybe most shockingly!) to have a little fun.

Every person I spoke to in that very full theatre could relate to Shirley- even the men, and the younger spectators. We look forward to her next visit!

gether. This is the first chance the cast has had to rehearse in front of the sets, and it is exciting to watch.



The cast ranges in age from 70+ down to very young (I am not a good judge of age!). The more senior actors are true panto veterans, but even the smaller ones tell me they have one or two pantos already under

their belts. Such professionalism in a small town! They rehearse the opening number, where proper "panto etiquette" is explained to the audience i.e. cheer the good guys, boo the baddies, and alert the hero when a villain is sneaking up from behind! And, oh yeah, duck when a handful of candies is heading your way. But Hudson panto regulars know all this.

Rapt attention is given to musical director and choreographer Donna Stewart, as she demonstrates and refines the steps, twirls, and hand gestures, and there is lots of laughter as the dance routines gradually fall into place. Donna, aided by local musician Tim Duggan Walsh, has written original musical numbers for this production. I heard a couple songs, and they are hilarious. On top of all this, the props have to be tried out, the backdrops tested and the costumes fitted - a million steps in this process of creation and improvisation that leads to a finished production.

Sitting in the theatre, some of

the younger performers clue me in about some things I don't quite understand yet, and one even offers me a chocolate mint girl guide cookie (which I love, and haven't tasted in years). There will be a glorious ball, and two VERY ugly step sisters who hope to win the prince by any means necessary. There will be spies (maybe royal ones?). an incidence of food poisoning, and apparently a horse. I may not yet understand everything that will happen in this performance, but it is clear that this version of Cinderella is unlike any other. Liberties have been taken, new plot twists added, but for me, some mysteries still remain. Thankfully. So I will line up with all the other faithful to see the final production

The Hudson Village Theatre pantomime is a proud tradition initiated by Heather Markgraf in 2000. It represents a huge gift of time and talent from all of the actors, backstage people, and volunteers who put it together, and it is created with love as a fundraiser for the theatre. We should feel proud and very lucky to have such a resource in our town.

ingredients. Very few items come from here and usually only those that we cannot get from Italy direct."

I asked Sal what kind of service and ambiance he set out to create at Salina from day one. Quick as a flash, he answered, "Lina and I wanted to create a friendly store where people love to shop. Our customers feel like family to us. And we felt is was important to make people feel at home the minute they arrive, which is why the first thing we do is offer them a coffee. And if there is a product they want that we do not have we will do our best to try and find it for them."

Added Sal, "We also recycle our boxes and reusable grocery bags to help decrease garbage and we also try to purchase products in glass, metal, or paper whenever possible. It's the little things that make a big difference and we want to be there for our customers."

Not only their customers, I should add, but also many worthwhile causes in the community that they support, such as the Firemen's Basket Fund, LePont Bridging Food Bank, Hudson Players Club, Hudson Creative Hub, Le Nichoir, the St. Lazare Garden Club, the St. Patrick's Day Parade, last year's James Ratcliffe fundraiser, and the Parliamo Italiano Vaudreuil Soulanges Club. And all this in just two years. Oof!

Hudson Film Society The Big Little Canadian Film Festival will be 10 years old in 2025 by Clint Ward

114 is the number of Canadian Feature length films that have graced the Hudson Village Theatre screen since 2016. Add to that the number of short films that Ben's Screening Room generated, and you end up with a history to be proud of. So there is reason to mark 2025 as a time to celebrate and feature the return of the on stage reception.

The Big little Canadian Film Festival is slowly attracting a following in the film industry and our 10th anniversary has attracted some guest interest. It has also put us in a position to select some of our films earlier than ever. We now feel that a Christmas launch of Ultimate Pass sales is a realistic goal and December sales through the Village Theatre box office will be possible. Before anyone can consider a purchase - some of the films and guests should be considered.

The present plan is to open the 2025 Festival on Easter Monday with a film that celebrates a major Quebec winter passion. I ce-Breaker is a film that tells the story of the 'Series of the Century' that involved the best hockey players of Canada against the best that the Soviet Union could offer. We all know how important that 8 game competition was and how it came down to the final goal in the Our Festival always features an important Day of First Nations Films. From a wide choice available, one film has already been selected. So Surreal: Behind the Masks is the storied journey of Indigenous masks and their profound impact on one of the most iconic art movements of all time. Part caper, part road trip, part spiritual journey the film follows award-winning Cree filmmaker, Neil Diamond as he travels coast-to-coast and across the Atlantic and back, gradually piecing together this groundbreaking global story of influence, reconnection and hopeful restitution.

At TIFF 2024, the audience choice for best Canadian film was, Berger (Shepherds). It is a Canadian-French drama film directed by Sophie Deraspe. An adaptation of Mathyas Lefebure's semi-autobiographical novel D'où viens tu, berger? Mathyas trades in his Montreal life as a young advertising executive to become a shepherd in the South of France. But the harsh realities of the pastoral world force him to question his romantic vision of the profession. A visit from Elise, a civil servant who has abruptly quit her job, gives Mathyas' quest a new direction. Together, with a herd in their care, they embark on

a journey towards a new way of life in the mountains.

Another TIFF 2024 film was Young Werther, longlisted for the 2024 Jean-Marc Vallée DGC Discovery Award. It offers a fresh, witty adaptation of Goethe's classic tale of unrequited love, placing it in modern-day Toronto.

Werther, an impulsive young man sent to retrieve a valuable family sculpture, only to be captivated by the magnetic Charlott, and her warmth and humor draw Werther into her world. Yet his newfound joy is bittersweet - she's already engaged to the kind but steadfast Albert.

Rather than leaving, Werther becomes entangled in a unique friendship with the couple, his love for Charlotte deepening in complexity and desperation. Their tangled emotions play out against the cityscape, balancing romance with humor as Werther's naïve passion brings both charm and chaos to their lives in a blend of vulnerability and humour, drawing the audience into an emotional rollercoaster that is both poignant and deeply relatable.

Montreal director Harley Chamandy was just 22 when he began shooting his debut feature film, Allen Sunshine, two years

So Surreal: Behind the Masks THE BIG LITTLE CANADIAN FILM FESTIVA

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J. S. Bach's Long Walk in the Snow Tom Allen presents a music-filled tale of romance, action and adventure by Kathryn Lamb

Tom Allen is the kind of guy who adores music, has a way with narrative, and enjoys combining these two elements in surprising and creative ways. He chooses a story - usually loosely based in musical history - where we know some of the facts, but maybe not all of the details, and creates a performance using music and narration to retell it in his own way.

This story recounts what happened to J.S. Bach when, as a young but somewhat hot-headed musician of 20, he set out from his home in Arnhiem to walk 400 km. north, in the middle of winter, to the larger centre of Lübeck. His goal was to meet and study with the iconic organist Buxtehüde who worked and played in the Marienkirche (St. Mary's Church) in that city. The story, as the narrator explains, is partly factual, and partly a question of "connecting the dots".

Entering the Hudson Village Theatre, the stage is framed by a gorgeous pair of harps. The caramel-coloured spruce sounding boards, the sinuous curved exotic woods that form the neck and shoulders of the instruments, all connected by pegs and strings that catch the light - It was visually stunning. The harpists are Lori Gemmel and Jennifer Swartz. Between them on stage sat Kate Bevan Baker (violin, voice), Sam Roberts (voice, guitar and violin) and Tom Allen (narrator and trombone).

We do know that when Bach arrived in Lübeck, Büxtehude invited him to stay with his family and to follow him around. Bach also met his oldest daughter Anna Margarethe, and it seems there might have been a little chemistry there.

Büxtehude was famous for an annual series of concerts called "Abendmusik" (evening music) for which he wrote the music, hired the necessary musicians and raised the funds through relationships with local merchants - a real impresario. Bach stayed and worked with him for three months.

How the musicians recount and accompany this story is both surprising and exciting. A gorgeous classical piece for harp can be followed by a contemporary voice and guitar solo by Sam Roberts (a well-known performer on his own). Kate Bevan Baker's elegant soprano aria morphs into a rendition of the 60's Leslie Gore anthem "You Don't Own Me". All the voices and instruments on stage - even the trombone - work together to tell this story.

Sometimes the instruments feel more like human voices, and sometimes vice-versa, but this just adds to the uniqueness and creativity of the presentation. You never know what's coming next.

J.S. Bach's Long Walk in the Snow is not Tom Allen's first visit to the Hudson Village Theatre, and I hope he will return in the future with another story told in his own particular way. I am not the most knowledgeable connoisseur of classical music, but I think his productions have expanded my understanding of music in general and have helped me think of these historic figures as being human like ourselves.

Both performances in this visit were sold out, and the spectators offered standing ovations both times. Each of the individual performers has impressive credentials in their own right, and I think we were fortunate to see them together here on our stage.

of the blue, haven't I just been reunited with a fellow cast member from that very show. Then 13, now 31, a graduate of John Abott College with an associate's degree in creative arts, literature, and languages and now living 7,000 km away in Poland together with the love of his life and teaching English to aspiring Polish actors there young and old.

His name? Kyle Gregor-Pearse, the son of long-time Hudsonites Eric Gregor-Pearse and Elizabeth Dawe and all remming from a little chat and heads up I had with Eric in the IGA parking lot recently when suddenly and for no real reason at all we got to talking about Christmases past and he gave me his email address. "Hi Kyle," I typed to him, obviously to his great surprise. "Your old Panto buddy James here. What's new?" And here's how the subsequent online conversation went.

Q: So what are you doing in Poland and how did this all come about? HVT. Do you remember?

A: Absolutely. First of all in Treasure Island in which I played a number of really fun chorus roles, including townfolk, pirate, and creature of the sea. And then in The Emperor's New Clothes the following year in which you played the role of Stuffy.

Q: You would go on to play in other Pantos at HVT. Why was this?

A: For sure. Such as Beauty and the Beast, Peter Pan, and finally Camelot. As to why, because I love the knee-slapping humour, the groaners, and all the audience interaction. I also love the community aspect, the teamwork, and all the stunning work that goes into the sets, costumes, choregraphy, and backstage coordination.

Q: You would also go on to appear in a lot of plays and productions after that. What were some of them?

A: Too many to mention here but here are a few that I will always remember. Alice in Wonderland, The Penelopiad, The Heidi Chronicles, Oklahoma, Lisistrata, No Sex
